


Waisman Center is home to one of five Regional Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs Centers in Wisconsin that are a part of a statewide network that provides free and confidential information and assistance to parents of children and youth with special health care needs and the professionals who work with them. CYSHCN centers are dedicated to meeting families' needs through information, referral and follow-up, parent-to-parent support and service coordination, through local Public Health Departments and other community agencies.

Childcare and Respite:

Childcare resource and referral agencies are located throughout the Southern Region. Wisconsin Child Care Resource & Referral Network, Inc. will direct you to the closest program in your area.

Respite care provides families with a qualified caregiver and a break from 24 hour care responsibilities and is a needed resource for most families with children and youth with special health care needs.

It can be challenging to find and fund respite care depending on personal and local resources. The Regional CYSHCN Center will help parents and providers identify possible sources of funding and qualified child care providers, according to each family's unique needs.

Health:

Public Health services include prenatal care coordination, local immunization clinics and home visits by public health nurses. Some local Public Health Departments provide school health nursing consultation, family planning services, home care, environmental health and the WIC nutrition program for pregnant and breastfeeding women and their children under 5 years of age.



Families can receive help with transportation for medical and non-medical destinations. Sometimes a family must pay privately and sometimes this is publicly funded depending on each individual situation, location, insurance and the transportation service's policy. Options are listed under Transportation, on the other side

Special Education:

All public schools are required to provide special education and related services to children who are eligible. The Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA) is the federal special education law that covers children ages 3 through 21. If the team of parents and school staff agrees a child is eligible, the team will create a written plan of services called an Individual Education Program (IEP) to determine how to best support the child. Advocacy agencies such as FACETS (Family Assistance Center for Education, Training and Support), WSPEI (Wisconsin Statewide Parent Educator Initiative) and district CESAs

Recreation

Many children and adults with disabilities benefit from sports and recreational activities. Often it is possible to participate in community or school events. Families frequently seek out recreation that they can enjoy with all members of their family. A variety of organizations provide recreation activities and are listed on the other side.

Health Care Coverage:

In Wisconsin there are various ways to meet eligibility criteria for Medicaid (Medical Assistance) programs such as BadgerCare, Healthy Start, SSI and Katie Beckett. These programs help pay for medical care for eligible children and youth with special healthcare needs. Each eligibility category has different criteria; some are based on parent income and assets and others are based on the child's unique needs and the level of care required to live at home.

Some children receive Medicare insurance. For questions regarding Medicare Part D, please contact Wisconsin Coalition for Advocacy.

www.mch-hotlines.org/firststep.html A statewide 24-hour information and referral service with trained parents of children with special health care needs and professional counselors who are available to talk over concerns, answer questions and identify resources to meet a caller's needs. Some topic areas include housing, recreational activities, community centers, transportation, domestic violence, energy assistance and support groups.

Planning for Adulthood:

Youth ages 14 to 21 with disabilities and their families can receive help with planning for the transition to adulthood. Activities include moving from pediatrician to adult health provider and exploring opportunities in education, work and community living. Examples of these include WI Division for Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR), Department of Public Instruction (DPI) and Independent Living Centers.

Infants and Young Children:

Early intervention services, through the Birth to 3 Program, are available in every Wisconsin county for children who meet eligibility criteria. Birth to 3 professionals work in partnership with parents to help children with developmental delays grow, learn and communicate. Services include evaluation and assessment, special instruction, therapy services and family centered service coordination. Birth to 3 staff work with parents to develop an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP) which is based on priorities and goals for the child and family. Before children reach age three, Birth to 3 staff help with transitions

Advocacy and Parent Training:

State and local agencies provide information and assistance for families looking for information on how to best understand protect and advance the legal, human and service rights of children. Examples include legal assistance, help with an IEP and health benefits counseling. Parent training groups help parents learn about resources and how to be a good advocate for their children.

The Dane County Human Services Department provides access to long-term supports and services for eligible children and adults experiencing cognitive, physical, developmental and emotional disabilities, chronic mental illness and alcohol, tobacco and other drug use. Programs that can help fund respite care and other identified needs include Family Support, Children's Waivers, Community Integration Programs (CIP) and Community Options Program (COP). Wrap-around programs can assist families with children who have severe emotional disturbances.
